MOTIONS TO AGREE

HB 168 - Telecommunications; modernize competition; provisions

- BILL SUMMARY: Seeks to completely eliminate the Universal Access Fund which was established in 1995 to aid telecommunication companies to bring parity between rates charged for intrastate connections with those of interstate connections.

HB 172 - Employees' Retirement System of Georgia; disability benefits; provisions

- BILL SUMMARY: This bill relates to the reexamination of persons receiving disability benefits under the Employees' Retirement System of Georgia. The bill removes provisions that medical examinations are to be made at the disability beneficiary's residence or place mutually agreed upon. The bill applies to those who first or again become members of the retirement system on or after September 1, 2010. The amount earnable beneficiary shall include any income payment received from workers' compensation; provided, however, that in the event of a lump sum payment, the monthly disability allowance shall be reduced on an actuarial basis as determined by the actuary of this retirement system.

HB 194 - Brand name drugs; substitute generic drugs; provisions

- BILL SUMMARY: HB 194 requires that if a generic drug is substituted for a name brand medication it must be shown on the prescription bottle label what the name brand medication was that was substituted.

HB 231 - Practice of architecture; projects within structures; clarify

- BILL SUMMARY: This bill takes out the word "office" in subsection (b) of Code Section 43-4-14, in order to allow the interior designers to design nonload-bearing walls in other structures, not just in the offices.
- HB 231 (Senate Substitute as Passed Senate on 03/30/10)

The Senate Substitute does the following:

- Changes the term "nonload-bearing" interior construction to "nonstructural" interior construction and defines it as the construction of nonload-bearing elements of a building that are not essential to the structural integrity of the building.

- Adds definitions for the terms of “interior design”, “interior construction document”, “building shell” and “building shell system”
- Authorizes registered interior designers to have a seal separate from the seal of registered architects.

HB 244 - Georgia Environmental Facilities Authority; change name to Georgia Environmental Finance Authority

- BILL SUMMARY: HB 244 changes the name of the "Georgia Environmental Facilities Authority" to the "Georgia Environmental Finance Authority".

HB 294 - Technical college or institution; legislative approval for creation or discontinuation; require

- BILL SUMMARY: Requires that the General Assembly must approve any consolidation, creation, suspension or discontinuation of a technical college or institution under the State Board of Technical and Adult education, otherwise such actions do not have any force or effect.

HB 320 - Georgia Environmental Facilities Authority; change name to Georgia Environmental Finance Authority

- BILL SUMMARY: This bill changes the name of the Georgia Environmental Facilities Authority to the Georgia Environmental Finance Authority.

HB 903 - County and municipal tax levies; fund domed stadium; revise provisions

- BILL SUMMARY: This bill provides for an extension of Atlanta's hotel motel tax past the current expiration date of December 31 2020, through 2050, to allow for discussions to begin between the Georgia World Congress Center and the Atlanta Falcons to determine if the Falcons will continue to play in Atlanta. The bill provides that the tax will be extended through 2050 if the same portion of the tax that is currently being used for funding of the Georgia Dome is used to fund a successor facility located on property owned by the World Congress Center and if a contract has been entered into between the Congress Center and a nation football league team for use of the facility through the end of the new extended period of the tax. In addition, during the extension of the tax, the same portion of the tax that is currently being used to fund other tourism initiatives in Georgia will continue to be used for that purpose.

HB 1055 - Drivers' licenses; fees for temporary licenses or identification cards; change

- BILL SUMMARY: HB 1055 updates fees throughout the Georgia code to ensure that they accurately reflect the cost of providing the service they are charged for.

- Having passed on a Motion to Agree as Amended by the House, the AM 18 1600ER applies as follows:

Part II: House Bill 307 is added, as it passed the Senate except the insurance premium tax exemption language is removed.

Part III in the amendment provides for a 5 year phase out of the state quarter mill of property tax starting in 2012. For tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2016, there will be no property tax quarter mill levied by the state. The tax bills must contain a statement providing that the reduction of the quarter mill tax rate is the result of property tax relief passed by the Governor and House of Representatives and the Georgia State Senate.

Part IV of the amendment provides for a gradual increase in the amount of retirement income excludable from state income tax for taxpayers age 65 and older beginning in 2012. Currently, taxpayers 62 and older may exclude \$35,000 of retirement income. In the amendment, in 2012, taxpayers that are 65 and older may exclude up to \$65,000. In 2013, this cap increases to \$100,000, in 2014 it increases to \$150,000, and in 2015 it increases to \$200,000. In 2016, the cap is eliminated, so that for taxpayers age 65 and older, all retirement income will be excluded from state income tax. The cap on excludable income for taxpayers age 62 to 64, and for permanently and totally disabled taxpayers that cannot perform gainful occupation, will remain at the current \$35,000 this year and going forward.

HB 948 - General appropriations; State Fiscal Year July 1, 2010 - June 30, 2011

- BILL SUMMARY: This bill provides appropriated sums of money for the State Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2010, and ending June 30, 2011. The funding will be used for the operation of the State government, its departments, boards, bureaus, commissions, institutions, and other agencies. Further, it provides funding for the university system, common schools, counties, municipalities, political subdivisions and for all other governmental activities, projects and undertakings authorized by law.

SB 355 - Health; provide that priority list of persons authorized to control the disposition of the remains of a deceased person

- BILL SUMMARY: This bill clarifies that if a deceased person dies while serving in any branch of the United States Armed Forces then whoever the deceased person designated on their United States Department of Defense Record of Emergency Data, DD Form 93, shall have second priority, after only a health care agent designated in an advance directive for health care, to direct disposition of the remains.

SB 374 - Legislative Economic Development Council; create

- BILL SUMMARY: This bill creates the Legislative Economic Development Council to be co-chaired by the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The Council will serve the purpose of evaluating the state's overall economic development strategy as well as reviewing all state funded activities and expenditures that go into implementing such strategy. This bill further outlines the composition of the Council as well as the Council's powers and duties. It also requires the Department of Economic Development to prepare a yearly report for submission to the members of the Council and the Governor, detailing the state's programs and activities related to job creation and economic development in Georgia.

- Hugley Amendment codifies into law, the MLK Commission which is responsible for a variety of functions serving to strengthen and improve race relations in Georgia. The Commission is currently only established through an executive order of the Governor.

SB 461 - Wills, Trusts, Estate; provide for construction of wills/trust instruments referring to federal estate; provide for judicial construction of such wills

- BILL SUMMARY: This bill is a stopgap to ensure that changes to federal estate and generation-skipping transfer tax law do not invalidate wills or trusts executed in Georgia. The bill provides that will or trust provisions relating to federal estate taxes should be construed in accordance with the law as it applied to decedents who died on December 1, 2009.

SB 6 - Driver's Licenses; restricted; change the penalty for violation

- BILL SUMMARY: This bill provides that when a person is required to wear prescription glasses but is not wearing them at the time of a traffic offense the court may order the Department of Driver Services to suspend the license for a period not to exceed six months, but is not required to do so.

SB 432 - "Advanced Broadband Collocation Act"; provide procedures; modification/collocation of wireless communication facilities

- BILL SUMMARY: This legislation provides procedural guidelines for the process in which local governments review applications for the modification or collocation of wireless communication facilities. The term collocation is defined as the process of placing or installing new wireless facilities on previously existing wireless support structures, negating the need for entirely new construction. Proposed collocations may not alter the existing structure by increasing the overall height or width, exceeding applicable weight limits, or increasing the dimensions previously approved by the local governing authority. Local governing authorities will have 90 days to determine approval on each collocation or modification application. The technical, business, or service characteristics of a proposed wireless facility are not subject to review in the approval process.

Game, Fish, & Parks

HR 1948 - South Atlantic Fishery Management Council; not prohibit Atlantic Ocean bottom fishing; urge

- BILL SUMMARY: HR 1948 strongly urges the South Atlantic Fishery Management Council not to recommend the prohibition of bottom fishing in large areas of the Atlantic Ocean, including an area off the coast of Georgia, as part of Amendment 17A to the Fishery Management Plan for the Snapper Grouper Fishery of the South Atlantic Region.

SB 99 - Boating Safety Zones; prohibit operation of certain vessels on Lake Sinclair

- BILL SUMMARY: Current law prohibits the operation of certain vessels on Lake Burton, Seed Lake, Lake Rabun, Lake Tugalo, Tallulah Falls Lake, and Lake Yonah. This legislation seeks to prohibit the operation of such vessels on Lake Sinclair as well. However, this prohibition will not apply to any vessel that was lawfully operated on Lake Sinclair immediately prior to the effective date of this legislation and was, as of such date, included on the tax roll of any county within which any part of such lake lies. For the purposes of this legislation, a "vessel" shall be defined as any motorized vessel greater than 30 feet six inches in length; except for law enforcement, scientific research, or dam operation and maintenance craft; or any vessel equipped with any type of baffler system.

SB 474 - Wildlife; possession of native wild animal killed by motor vehicle; provide exceptions and conditions

- BILL SUMMARY: SB 474 requires those who accidentally kill a bear or deer with their vehicle to report the accident to the Department of Natural Resources or local law enforcement within 48 hours.

Higher Education

SB 340 - Education; require school systems to adopt a reporting system for the purpose of determining potential HOPE eligibility

- BILL SUMMARY: Senate Bill 340 would require each school system, private and public, to send an electronic transcript to the Georgia Student Finance Commission for each student (9th-11th grade). In order to give school counselors, parents and students the ability to determine whether their academic standing will render them eligible for HOPE before 12th grade, the Georgia Student Finance Commission will evaluate grades as well as the schools grading scale to give an accurate record through out a students academic career. Each school system will be required to begin sending electronic transcripts of all students to GSFC in 2011. This measure will also insure that each school will be required to send the student current HOPE GPA to the parent.

While currently, this type of reporting is required for 12th grade students, Senate Bill 340 would initiate the tracking process when students enter high school. This tool will insure that students are fully aware of their eligibility status for the HOPE scholarship before applying or entering a postsecondary institution.

SB 345 - Rules of the Road; allow races on county/municipal roads when sanctioned by the local governing authority/ road is closed to traffic

- BILL SUMMARY: Allows road races to be held if sanctioned by the county or municipal government and if roads are closed to traffic. Notice of the race must also be published in the official county organ one month before the date of the race.

SB 373 - Peace Officers; investigation of an applicant's good moral character; applying for appointment or certification

- BILL SUMMARY: Allows investigation of persons applying for a position as a certified peace officer by the law enforcement agency considering the application. This bill also allows the agency to gather employment related data upon the approval by the candidate.

SR 513 - Joint Georgia State Fire Services Study Committee; create

- BILL SUMMARY: Creates the Joint Georgia State Fire Services Study Committee.

Transportation

SB 22 - Georgia Coordinating Council for Rural and Human Services Transportation; establish

- BILL SUMMARY: This bill creates the Georgia Coordinating Committee for Rural and Human Services Transportation to encourage efficient transportation service delivery in the rural areas of the state and to coordinate human service transportation services in both the rural and urban parts of the state. Creates a coordinating council between six Georgia Agencies, at no additional cost to the state, to use our federal transportation dollars more efficiently and end the duplication of services for our rural transit services. Six agencies are:

Department of Transportation, Department of Human Services, Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities, Department of Community Health, Department of Labor, Department of Community Affairs.

SB 519 - Motor Vehicles; motorized cart; modify definition; change hours of operation; provide local governments decide operators be licensed

- **BILL SUMMARY:** Amends Georgia code (40-1-1) relating to motorized carts. This bill states that carts may be operated on streets a half hour before sunrise and a half hour after sunset unless the local government or commissioner of public safety says the carts may be operated during the hours between sunset and sunrise. If the carts are allowed to operate during said hours they must have two headlights, two tail lamps, two brake lights, four turn signal lamps (two in front, two in rear), a center high mount stop lamp (CHMSL), and a windshield.

SB 520 - Transportation Dept.; provide for an Intermodal Division within the department

- **BILL SUMMARY:** Code Section 32-2-41 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated is revised by revising paragraph (5) subsection (b) by adding an Intermodal Division to be supervised by an appointee serving at the pleasure of the commissioner to the Department of Transportation.

SR 1075 - CSA Army of Tennessee Highway; dedicate

- **BILL SUMMARY:** SR 1075 is a package of road/bridge dedications throughout the state of Georgia.

Ways & Means

SB 346 - Ad Valorem Taxes; revise comprehensive provisions

- **BILL SUMMARY:** SB 346 provides for comprehensive changes to the property tax code. It provides that notices of property value assessments will be sent out by the board of assessors annually, rather than only in years when the value is changed. This will ensure every property owner has a right to appeal their valuation every year. It also provides for a state-wide uniform assessment notice to be established by the commissioner of the Department of Revenue. This notice must contain an estimate of current year's taxes which will use the current assessment and the previous year's millage rate.
- The bill also provides for a new appeal process for non-homestead properties valued at \$1 million or more. Appeals on these properties may be made to a hearing officer which will be a certified appraiser. Just as with appeals to the board of equalization, decisions of the hearing officers may be appealed to the superior court. The bill provides for oversight of the boards of equalization and the hearing officers by the clerk of the superior court. The bill also provides that the transaction amount of an arms length, bona fide sale shall be the maximum fair market value for tax purposes in the next taxable year following the sale. "Arms length, bona fide sale" is defined in the bill as a transaction between unaffiliated parties.
